- **THE JEAN MONNET CHAIR IN EUROPEAN INTEGRATION OF THE UNIVERSITÉ DE MONTREAL** ([www.monnet.umontreal.ca](http://www.monnet.umontreal.ca))

In November 1993, the European Commission established the Jean Monnet Chair at the Université de Montréal. The Chair's mandate is to promote:

The CÉRIUM is a high-level multidisciplinary team of researchers specialized in the study of international issues. This team includes research units (associated centers, chairs and institutes), and individual researchers.

**A. The registration fee is 1,200\$ CAN or 800 Euros** and includes:

Participants are free to choose where they want to take their meals. (Several inexpensive restaurants surround the University).

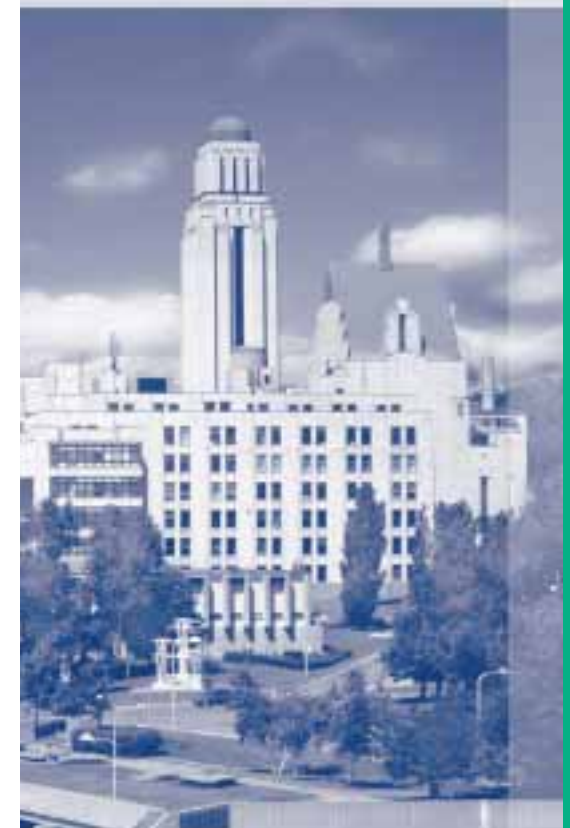
## LEISURE ACTIVITIES
